New Home for Horses Helping People!

At last we're able to bring you the good news we've been wishing for – Horses Helping People has found a permanent base at Sunrise Farm near Mentmore, Bucks. We're delighted to report that Aylesbury Vale District Council has just approved planning permission for the stables, riding arena and office block. Work will progress on the new site as and when funding and weather allows, so we anticipate the move to take place over the winter months. Hopefully there will be very little disruption to normal services. We'd like to thank Mentmore Parish Council for their support during the planning process – we're looking forward to being part of their community.

Sunrise Farm is currently a pasture field with no buildings, so there is a lot of exciting work ahead. We'd love you to get involved – see the end of this newsletter for some practical ways to help.

Welcome to Sunrise Farm

So what does the future hold for Horses Helping People? Sunrise Farm is a 22 acre field, giving a lot of potential for improving and expanding our activities. On the horse side, we will eventually have indoor and outdoor riding arenas, with a sensory riding trail and spacious paddocks for the horses. There will be much more of a farm environment, with plans to plant an orchard, some woodland, and a hay meadow. We will be preserving traditional local species in the orchard, and also having some rare breed animals, such as chickens and pigs. Wildlife and conservation habitats will be created around the site. This means lots more activities for visitors to take part in, including learning how to work the land with horses. Facilities for people will include an indoor activity room with viewing over the paddocks – ideal also for the professional training courses we run. We'll give you updates in the newsletter, or you could join our Facebook page for more regular updates.

The children, aged 5 – 18, took part in a variety of activities including grooming, riding, learning about horse care and a nature trail. One of the most popular activities according to the children? – clearing horse poo from the paddocks!

Our **Aylesbury Vale Community Chest** funding has enabled us to link with Florence Nightingale Hospice to provide therapeutic horsemanship for families using their service.

What makes a good therapeutic horse?

People often ask us what makes a good therapeutic horse. It really depends on the activities you are asking of them, but here's what we look for at Horses Helping People.

Our horses have to be able to cope with unpredictable behaviour and unusual situations, but also to remain responsive and willing to interact with people. We don't want them to cope with the unexpected by being so desensitised that they shut down. It is preferable for them to be aware of what is around them, but calm enough to accept it without fear. An important part of their preparation is to develop trust in the staff member as the 'safe' leader, so if the horse is uncertain about anything it can look to that person for reassurance.

We have eleven horses in the herd, of different shapes, sizes and ages, and very different personalities. All the horses play some role in the therapeutic activities. Some choose to participate only occasionally, but provide very powerful interactions when they do. Others are dependable and versatile, happy to take part in a range of activities with different clients. All will continue to offer different qualities at different stages of their lives, enriching the lives of people that meet them.



Career training at Horses Helping People

We are still fitting in our one day training courses around the move, and have enjoyed meeting some enthusiastic new recruits to the world of therapeutic horsemanship. We love sharing our experience with people on the courses and continuing to support them as their new centres start to help people around the UK.
